Expert Profile: Dr. Sheryar Afzal



Dr. Sheryar Afzal is working as an Assistant Professor/Senior Lecturer in the department of Scientific Basis of Therapeutics, Faculty of Pharmacy, MAHSA University. He earned his PhD (Pharmacology) in 2017 from Universiti Sains Malaysia (USM), Penang, Malaysia as USM fellowship holder with research entitled "Hemodynamic effects of adiponectin on PPAR-gamma receptors in diabetic and non-diabetic Wistar Kyoto and Spontaneously hypertensive rats and was awarded with "SANGGAR SANJUNG AWARD 2014".

He has 15 years of teaching and research experience. His basic research interest encompasses Pharmacology of cardiovascular & renal system at receptor levels in diabetic and hypertensive experimental animal models, Pharmacokinetics of indigenous and synthetic formulations and Toxicity of indigenous medicinal plants. During his research career, he published 21 research publications in well reputed high impact factor journals with more than 38 abstract proceedings at national and international level. He had the opportunity to supervise 5 and Co-supervised 6 Postgraduate students during their research projects at under and Post-graduate level. Recently he received research project grant of RM76, 000 from MAHSA Research Management Centre, Malaysia.

His veterinarian background with Ph.D in Pharmacology is an added advantage in developing different experimental animal models for the scientific study including diabetic, hypertensive and renal hypertensive models.

His future research plan is to evaluate and determine the pathophysiological role and potential implications of various experimental diabetic models in a state of metabolic syndrome at molecular level for the advanced scientific information and update for teaching and clinical research purposes.

Stigma of Mental Illness

Mental health illness is a great public health concern throughout the world. It became an integral part of Sustainable Development Goals agenda to transform the world by 2030. The incidences of stigma among young people keep on increasing, yet the frequency of help seeking is low, especially among those from lower socioeconomic backgrounds. Mental Illness is predicted to be the second biggest health problem among Malaysian after heart disease by 2020. According to National Health and Morbidity Survey 2015, People with mental illness are wrongly seen as dangerous, violent and unpredictable. It is also been believed that a person who has been mentally ill can never be normal.

There are many forms of mental illness, which can differ by its severity, duration and degree. As emphasized my Malaysian Mental Health Association mental illness is a distribution that can affect thinking, feeling and behavior that will interrupt normal functioning in daily life. Most mental illness can be treated and controlled. They may have to take medications at times or permanently, but once recovered their behavior becomes more consistent.

Statistics: Mental Health Illness in Malaysia

Every 3 in 10 adults aged 16 years and above age group have some sort of mental health problems (29.2%). The prevalence of mental health problems among adults increased from 10.7% in 1996, to 11.2% in 2006, to 29.2% in 2015. The prevalence in Kuala Lumpur is 39.8%. The prevalence in females was slightly higher than in males but the difference was not significant (30.8% vs 27.6%).



Causes of Mental Illness

Mental illness can be recognized by symptoms. These include anxiety, depression, intense, fear, paranoia, delusion, hallucinations and unusual elation. There are no affirming causes to theses mental disturbances. It is often related to emotional stress and difficult coping with conflict or adjusting to certain events. Other factors include biochemical imbalance, deterioration of brain cells and alcohol or drug abuse.

Types of Stigma in Mental Illness

The stigma of mental illness is divided into two types:

- Social stigma, which involves the prejudiced attributes that others have around mental illness
- Self-perceived stigma, which involves an internalized stigma that person with the mental illness suffers from.

Causes of Stigmatization

Knowledge and understanding can affect the form of response someone have. Knowing the definition of mental illness will be necessary build up positive understanding among this group of people. Stigmatization toward mental illness people also exist widely among healthcare professional. Mental illness can happen to professional and non-professional individuals. The understanding of the surrounding people will then determine the kind of stereotype build up. As understanding should stand together with knowledge influence from media is also contributing factor.

Consequences of Stigmatization

The stigmatization will eventually develop the fear of rejection by other which can delay or impede them of getting help and treatment. This may worsen someone's mental health problems and recovery which can trap people in a cycle of illness. It may also leads to increase in social isolation, poor social support, poor quality of the life and low self-esteem.

Stigma Reduction Strategies

Stigma arises from the negative beliefs regardless of what knowledge they have regarding mental health problem. It's crucial to change these beliefs other than just providing knowledge about mental health problem. Improving social relations between individuals with or without mental health problems is also one of the ways of changing the stereotypes. Community based approach should be expanded and it is believed that community-based care is more responsive compared to institutional care. It allows the patient to stay within the support system. They should be included in community activities and family members and friends must always give their full support to them. It is also important to education oneself to raise their voice against stigma by talking openly about mental health, educate others on mental illness, eliminate the "name calling" for example associating the mental health illness with "madness" and also encourage others to show more compassion to those with mental illness.
